She is the Clinical Lead of the Inclusion Health Service in St James's Hospital dedicated to improving access to specialist hospital care for socially excluded individuals.*

*Her research seeks to look at the effect of social exclusion on health from a number of perspectives. Current projects include a study using translational simulation to support hospital staff in providing psychological trauma-informed care, a HRB-funded Secondary Data Analysis Project working on integrating health datasets with datasets identifying experiences of social exclusion, and studies on the effect of psychosocial stress on the the brain and the immune system. She is also part of the SFI-funded COVID-19 Research Hub in TCD, with a particular interest in looking at why people who are marginalized are more likely to get severe COVID-19. She has a strong interest in ensuring equity of outcomes for socially excluded people living with HIV.*

Her research is conducted within the UCL Collaborative Centre for Inclusion Health (CCIH), which she co-founded and was the inaugural chair of for three years. She is currently completing a part-time National Institutes of Health Research (NIHR) funded clinical doctoral research fellowship in public health at CCIH on hospital-based preventative interventions for people experiencing homelessness. She is also a co-investigator on several other Inclusion Health grants and supervises master’s students’ and medical residents’ Inclusion Health projects. Serena is a keen educator. She established the first master’s level course on Homeless and Inclusion Health with free, supported places for people with lived experience of exclusion. She then went on to set up a new interdisciplinary online Master of Public Health (MPH) at UCL, which she now co-directs. In her public health specialist role, she advises on Inclusion Health strategy, research, and education to UCL Hospital and the UK national government. She is also a Public Health Fellow for Pathway, the UK’s leading homeless healthcare charity.</i></p> <p><i>Serena completed the London public health training scheme in 2017 and became a registered Fellow of the UK Faculty of Public Health (FFPH). She has recently completed Ireland's first Clinical Fellowship in Paediatric Inclusion Health and is a member of the Children's Health Ireland Global Health steering group.*
